Gifts Grant the Present Building a Future.

Making a sentence out of those words is easy. The first four can be used either as a name or an action. The fifth sums up their combined impact. Each word alone was very important in 2017.

Gifts of time, talent and money from members, musicians, and visitors kept activities humming on the corner of Fifth and Scott Streets. Musical Mondays, organ concerts, car shows, craft shows brought in friends from far and near. Celebrations included five weddings, two graduation parties, a commencement ceremony, a 100th birthday party, fund-raisers, and meetings. More than 1200 people stopped to visit during summer hours.

Grant should actually be plural. Last year, a grant from the Keweenaw Community Foundation provided funds for an assessment of the building's needs. During 2017, those same funds allowed for weather stripping around the doors and for lock repair on the front door. "Warm" and "Safe" are also really important words. (We love not using a chain on the front door!) To follow up on the suggestions about the needs of the building, we are grateful to the Americana Foundation and the Keweenaw National Historical Park Advisory Commission.

Present ought to be plural too. The word can mean "gift" or describe a time period. In addition, it has the action of making something appear. Funds from the grants *presented* the resources for replacement of glass blocks, tuck pointing, refurbishing window frames, repairing both the leaking roof and the ceiling damaged by the leaks, and repairing the front steps.

Building is another case of a word that names and acts. Gifts, grants, and presents were all devoted to the structure and *built* its safety and security.

Pictures of the projects will show what was done to assure the **Future**. We hope you will be pleased by what you see and will continue to be a part of all our efforts.

The organ continues traditional musical heritage.

Grants provide resources to attend to the Building's Needs

Last year's newsletter celebrated the awarding of a grant from the Herman Gundlach fund at the Keweenaw Community Foundation. The KHC Board had asked for help in hiring a professional engineer to assess the needs of the building. The generosity of the Keweenaw Community Foundation allowed us to hire Michael Drewyor. We received his report after the 2016 newsletter went to print. We were relieved to know that the building is basically sound, but that there were some things that needed immediate attention as well as some that require planning for the future.

The grant application also requested funds for some things that were obviously needed:

professionally done weather stripping and lock repair.



After 116 years of service, the lock on the front door had had enough! It just would not turn.

Although the chain seemed to be a solution, it didn't really do the job. The door would open a crack and let water and snow come in.

To the rescue came Peninsula Locksmiths. She got the old lock to work and also ordered an antique replacement.

RE Johnson Company completed the rescue with great weather stripping on all doors and even donated part of their services. Thank you!

There's an old adage that "Knowledge is Power". Unfortunately, knowing what needed to be done didn't mean that we had the power to do it. It was time to turn to old friends for more help.

Some years ago, the Board of the Americana Foundation visited the building. We showed them the videotape that Bob Langseth shot when the building was first acquired. One of their Board members watched it and made this comment, "I can't believe you didn't just walk away from it." Since that time, the Americana Foundation has been a wonderful friend to the Keweenaw Heritage Center, providing both moral and financial support.

This time was no exception. We requested funds to fulfill the needs identified as immediate. Those included: tuckpointing areas on the north and south side of the building; replacing broken glass blocks on the lower level; repairing areas that leaked on the roof; repairing the ceiling upstairs where water had leaked; repairing the front steps; and painting and restoring the frames around the stained glass windows.

To say that we were thrilled when we got the reply from **Americana** would be an understatement. They had agreed to our request for \$25,000! It would go a long way toward the needed repairs.

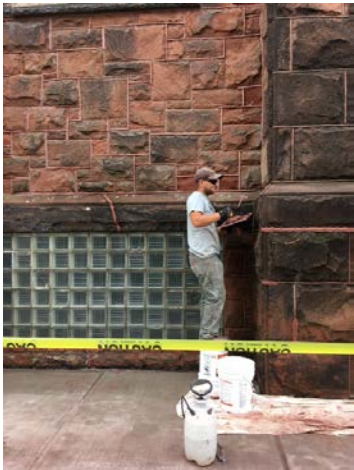
The Keweenaw Heritage Center is one of the Heritage Sites that make up the **Keweenaw National Historical Park**. When the announcement that Heritage Sites could apply for funding from the **Advisory Commission**, we applied. Our request for \$15,000 was granted! Wow! Making all the recommended repairs could be a reality.

Thanks to John Sullivan for his help (pro bono, completely donated), descriptions and the need for bids went out to local contractors. Repairs on the roof came first; the rest had to wait until fall. Pictures on the following pages show the progress.

Tuckpointing needs



Mortar between the sandstone block deteriorates, causing the blocks to shift and leak. Both the back and front of the building had places with significant deterioration. A few places on the sides showed problems and repairs in the stones around the glass blocks were needed.

Your Gift to a genealogist or historian could be a Present to the Building. Since 2005, CDs of the Calumet and Hecla Records have raised more than \$5,000.

Here's a recent chapter in the story. Late in November, this request came in:

Hello, I saw on an Ancestry message board that it was possible to obtain a copy of the cd containing the listing of the Calumet and Hecla pay records. Is that still true? If it is possible, I would be very interested. Happy to provide a donation for obtaining the records if you could provide me details as to where to send the funds.

The response:

Yes, the CD is still available but there are some things you should know about it. The original records were in a fire. Many cards were damaged or destroyed. As a result, there are no last names beginning with A. B names start with Bas. There are no last names beginning with E or I. There are some DA but they end before DAV. Only 1 name that begins with F survived. The Gs start after GA.

That said, there are 15,108 names. Not all have full information. Some have only names. Fields include last name, first name, pay #, start date, position, date of birth, place of birth, immigration date, marital status, spouse name, # of children, date of death, place of death, cause of death, last place of employment, whether reads and writes, and any comments.

All proceeds go to the Keweenaw Heritage Center, a building essentially abandoned but restored through donations and volunteer work. We ask for a \$20 donation plus \$3 postage. If you still think you want a CD, let me know. You can send a check made out to Keweenaw Heritage Center and I'll get the CD in the mail to you. My address is Jean Ellis, 167 E. North St., Eagle Harbor, MI 49950.

And here was her reaction:

Jean, just wanted to let you know I received the CD yesterday. Thanks so much for such quick turnaround. I already found a specific person I had been looking for.

My grandfather came from the Canavese region in Italy and his 1900 passenger record says he's heading to Calumet, but I have found no record of him anywhere until 1910 in San Francisco. I read about the fact that a lot of people from that area in Italy went to the Calumet and Houghton County area, but it's really cool to have the spreadsheet where I can see specific people from the area and the wider Piedmont area in Italy, and be able to sort and search the spreadsheet to really get at the information. When I was in Italy two years ago and met for the first time some second cousins in San Benigno (a location on the list a lot) we talked about the migration and they had heard of Calumet (!) and that it was a place relatives and ancestors, their neighbors and friends went to.

I haven't found my grandfather yet - it's possible he's on the list with a name misspelled (he also lived under a different name, and maybe he used one I'm not aware of) so will keep looking, but I found my great-uncle who I knew arrived in America in 1903 but could never figure out where he was until 1913. Now I know where he was at least at one point during that period and it helps to reinforce the theory that my grandfather was possibly also there somewhere. There are also other familiar names I'm seeing for me to compare to my family tree. Cool!

Anyway, thank you again for all your hard work on this.
